

The Little Red Marble by Randy Johnson



We are told many times in the Scriptures to be witnesses for Christ. Here are just two passages on this subject: 2nd Cor. 5:20; Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God were making an appeal through us: "We beg you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God." And again in: Acts 1:8; But you will receive the power, when the Holy Spirit has come upon you: and shall be My witness both in Jerusalem, and all Judaea and I all Samaria, and even to the remotest parts of the earth. (Both from the NASB).

We are to be the hands, and feet, AND VOICD of Christ on earth today. But many of us find it difficult to talk to people we do not know well about our faith. Those who know us well, know they can call on us for help in times of need. And we respond to the best of our ability. But those who don't know us well just don't ask. It is up to us to see the need and offer something. I always found this very difficult - until about Christmas 2011. I started carrying red marbles in my pocket because of the story I'm going to tell you below.

There was an elderly retired gentleman living near Waxachie. He preferred to not cook more often than was necessary. So nearly every morning he would walk down town to have breakfast in one of the cafés or diners near his home. Not always going to the same establishment, he had the opportumity to meet his old friend and to make new friends. He talked to them and often they told him their troubles.

He was known for always having some red marbles in his pocket and giving them away. When he met someone he felt may be in need of lifting up, he would give them a red marble and say: "This red marble is to remind you of the blood of Christ, who died on the cross for you." He would also tell them to keep the marble as long as they needed it and then pass it on to someone else in need when the time was right. He would end with, "You can't keep it – you must pass it on."

When the old man died hundreds of red marbles were found in his house. A friend of mine helped the old man's children clear out the house and asked about the marbles. At hearing what they had been used for he asked to have some of the marbles. They gave him all of them.

My friend told the story of the red marbles and passed them out at his church, at work, and everywhere he went. Eventually, I received several from him at an Emmaus Team training session. I gave some to my wife and my son received his on his Walk to Emmaus in February 2012.

My family and I all carry red marbles. And we do pass them out, particularly my son, John. In the past few months I have heard about a dozen stories of the red marble and how it helped someone in a difficult time. I have passed out quite a few and wish to tell you one of my stories.

About a year ago there was a friendly, pretty, and very helpful young woman in one of my classes. Her husband was overseas in the war and was due back about half way through the semester. She told me she would be absent a couple days when he returned. He was to return on a Wednesday and needless to say she was not in class that day. But surprisingly, she missed the entire next week. When she showed up on the following Monday it was obvious that there was a problem. She looked to have been crying for days and had lost weight. This once happy and pretty lady now looked rather sad. She asked to speak with me privately. We went into the hall and she told me that her husband told her first thing after arriving home that he wanted a divorce. She was devastated. Tears rolled down her face and she lost the ability to talk. She just cried. I comforted her the best I could with a friendly touch and reassuring words, but the crying continued.

Finally, I remembered the red marble in my pocket. I placed it in her hand and said, "This red marble is to remind you of the blood of Christ, who died on the cross for you. Call on him in this time of need." I also told her, "Keep it with you always as long as you feel you need it. Then pass it on to someone else who needs it. You will know when to pass it on." The crying stopped and she smiled again and simply said, "Thank you."

Because she had missed so many classes she decided to drop my class and return the next semester. When she showed up on the first day of the next term, her beauty and self confidence had returned. The first thing she did when she came into the room was hug me and whisper another thank you in my ear.

We never talked about the divorce and how she and the children were doing until the last day before the final exam. She had a very high "A" average and the exam would be no problem for her. But after class we talked a bit and she said that she was getting on with her life and all was working out for her and the children. I asked about the red marble and she pulled it out of her pocket and told that it had been the beginning of her recovery.

A little red marble, just about $\frac{1}{2}$ " in diameter, brought her back to the Christ she had forgotten was always there for her. She said that prayer had sustained her.



OVER THE COMPOST PILE

During the early 60's, Ethel Woodby - my mother - was the Society Editor for the Denton Record Chronicle. Amongst her daily reporting duties was her award-winning Sunday column "Over the Coffee Cup."

She wrote about every-day life events, usually humorous, as if she were having a kitchen table conversation with a neighbor. In one article she told of our trip to Houston when my

uncle gave me a baby alligator. The ensuing bath with my pet was the subject of the article. Needless to say, this was a hard thing to live down for a 10-year-old girl!

This story prefaces my dubbing this column "Over the Compost Pile." I can't promise to be as funny as mother. But I will attempt to put some humor into my gardening advice.

If your success at seed germination is sketchy, the Lampasas Bloom Fest is just around the corner in April. There you can buy flowers and vegetables ready for planting. Robin (my farming partner) and I will be there too!

Potatoes should be planted now. Cut seed potatoes so that each piece has 3–4 eyes per 3–4 ounce piece. Coat with sulfur powder and let set for a few days. Plant the potatoes with the eyes up in a three inch trench, 18 inches apart. Cover with soil. When the plant breaks the surface, cover with another three inches of soil so that just the tip of the plant is showing. Repeat this once more (to prevent sun burn which will turn the potatoes green and inedible). It takes over 100 days for potatoes to mature to size. For new potatoes, harvest earlier.

Right now I have lettuce and Swiss chard ready for harvest. In the garden I have potatoes, onions, leeks, collard greens, several types of cabbage, garlic and spring peas. I have hundreds of vegetables and flowers started in the green house.

Local farmers markets will soon get underway. I can't give specific dates yet, but will as soon as possible. I will probably only be at the Copperas Cove and Killeen markets on Saturdays this year. But I will post lists of what is available on the bulletin board on Sundays from which produce can be ordered for me to bring the following Sunday. Look for the "Fresh From The Field" banner at the markets. That's our logo.

Mary's Coffee Cake

I brought this to church a couple of weeks ago, and several people asked me to put the recipe in this month's newsletter - so here it is!

Dough Ingredients:

1/2 cup butter

1/2 cup Crisco

1-1/2 cup sugar

2 eggs

1 cup sour cream


1 tsp vanilla

2 cups sifted flour (you don't have to sift it - but I do)

2 tsp baking powder

1/2 tsp salt

Topping & Middle:



1 tsp cinnamon

4 tablespoons sugar

Directions:

Grease and flour a bundt pan. Mix the dough ingredients in the order listed above, beating well after each addition. Put half the dough mixture in the bundt pan. Put about 1/2 or 3/4 of the topping mixture on the dough, then add the rest of the dough (this can be sticky and messy - don't worry). Sprinkle the remaining topping on top of the batter.

Bake for 1 hour at 350. (Don't rush this.) Cool thoroughly in the bundt pan before removing. This is good for eating right away, or freezing for later.

Note: No one in my family has ever been really successful at doubling this recipe - so I wouldn't advise it - but if you feel lucky, go right ahead! :)
